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Evelyn Lear & Thomas Stewart Emerging Singers Program

The 4th Emerging Singers Concert – May 3, 2002 at the German Embassy, Washington, DC

The development of Wagner singers poses formidable challenges to the music world. When is a singer ready to do Wagner? How does one guide a Wagner singer's career? These and other questions are at the heart of the Evelyn Lear and Thomas Stewart Emerging Singers Program, which provides guidance from two veteran professionals. Started in 1999 the program has invited 13 singers to perform in four separate concerts at the German Embassy, Washington, DC; singers selected by Lear and Stewart include: Nathan Bahny; Connie Coffelt; Alma DeLon; Jason Detwiler; Amy Fuller; Ray L. Selected Achievements - ESP Singers

Amanda Mace (soprano) Sang in the May 2001 ESP concert. She has sung with the Oregon Bach Festival, the Beethoven Academic Orchestra of Antwerp and, with less than three days notice last year, in the Verdi *Requiem* in Hannover, Germany. She returns to Hannover to sing in a Beethoven 9th this summer and later will sing in the Pendericki *Credo* and Bruckner *Te Deum* at the Oregon Bach Festival. He has sung 13 leading roles with Opera San Jose where he also completed a four-year Principal Artist Residency. Upcoming engagements include Siegmund in the Virginia Opera's *Die Walküre* this October as well as Erik in *Der Fliegende Höllender* for Minnesota Opera.

Jennifer Wilson (soprano) Sang in the October 2001 ESP Concert. A Washington area resident she is known for her recent performances success in the Brahms *Requiem*. She is preparing to make her professional debut as Turandot at the Connecticut Opera in the fall.



Wagner Society Award to Maestro Heinz Fricke 56 Years of Conducting Achievements!



Highlights of Maestro Fricke's long and distinguished career were noted by Chairman Holman in presenting the award at the 4th Annual Banquet (May 31). Maestro Fricke's 56 years in the conductors podium include 32 years at the Staatsoper Berlin, as well as years in Munich and Vienna. He has been Music Director of the Washington Opera since 1989 and has conducted numerous performances each season. Holman noted that opera fans in the Washington area, as well as across the U.S. and abroad, are especially grateful to him for making his orchestra into a beautiful instrument. Washington audiences fondly recall his masterful *Tristan and Isolde* in March 1999 and *Parsifal* in November 2001. On accepting the Award, Maestro Fricke's mentioned his love of Wagner's music. In the course of his career, he has conducted, *inter alia*, 10 complete Wagner *Rings*, 112 *Lobengrins*, 148 *Tannhaüsers*, 88 *Parsifals*, 72 *Meistersingers*, 167 *Fliegende Höllenders and 114 Tristan und Isolde*. Winter and Spring 2002 Program Season

Four major lecture programs during the Winter and Spring 2002 Season were presented in The George Washington University Funger Hall.

Winnie Klotz, Metropolitan Opera Official Photographer The Wonderful World of Grand Opera: How it all Happens Winnie Klotz gave new dimensions to WSWDC programming. Her lecture demonstration (May 16) was based on her copious collection of slides made during her years as the Met's official photographer. She provided original and amusing backstage highlights, drawing on her wide experience and knowledge of opera illustrated by her sensitive photography. A lively discussion with the audience following her formal presentation.





Carol Berger, author, musicologist and WSWDC Member spoke on "The Dialectics of Meistersinger: Sacred Ritual in the Awakened State". In a lecture (March 14) interpreting the philosophical, psychological and artistic currents that transverse Wagner's music dramas, Berger drew on her original research and thinking in a lively lecture and discussion program.

Professor Donald Crosby, author, teacher, German cultural history expert, and WSWDC Member spoke on "Origins of Originality: Richard Wagner and the German Tradition"

Drawing on a life time of scholarship and writing, the former University of Connecticut professor presented (February 14) a wide ranging review of the sources of Wagner's music dramas.
