

In the festive atmosphere of the 5th Annual Banquet on June 22 and in special celebration of that milestone, The Wagner Society of Washington DC Award was presented to Evelyn Lear, for her many contributions to the study and enjoyment of Wagner's art, especially the Evelyn Lear and Thomas Stewart Emerging Singers Program. The Award was presented by Chairman J.K. Holman on behalf of the Society, after a memorable and moving recording was played of Ms. Lear's "Dich teure Halle, grüss ich wieder" from Tannhäuser for the appreciative banquet audience. The program also included a solo performance of two Wagner arias by Michael Hayes with Betty Bullock at the piano. Ms. Lear joins the distinguished ranks of previous Awardees: Martin Feinstein, Thomas Stewart, Father M. Owen Lee, Placido Domingo, and Heinz Fricke.

Sixth Evelyn Lear and Thomas Stewart Emerging Singers Concert May 16th at the German Embassy, Washington, DC

The unwavering devotion of Evelyn Lear and Thomas Stewart to the Emerging Singers Program named in their honor continues to provide unique assistance to singers seeking to develop careers in the Wagner repertoire. Six concerts have been presented to date at the Germany Embassy with 20 singers since the first concert in April 2000. The Seventh Concert in the series takes place on September 21 at the Smithsonian Institution (see program schedule page 6). Singers are prepared for each concert through extensive personal coaching and rehearsals with Lear and Stewart. Advice on career development and contacts follows and selected singers are given financial assistance.

Wagner in der Wildnis III (Siegfried) June 9-11

The third annual *Wagner in der Wildnis* has held in the bucolic hills of West Virginia at a new site this year: Cacapon Resort State Park. The three day event was attended by 30 Members who gathered for intensive study and enjoyment of *Siegfried*. Once again, Professor Simon Williams, the University of California, Santa Barbara, and New York-based Pianist Jeffrey Swann were the main lecturers. For the second year, Member Bill Pastor also presented a lecture providing unique insights to Wagner's operas and historical sources for *Siegfried*. The Saturday night highlight was the reading of the libretto by a dedicated cast. Participants included Wildnis veterans as well as new Members, some of whom were preparing for Bayreuth 2003. Plans are underway for next year: *Götterdämmerung!*

Chronology of Winter-Spring 2003 Program Season

January 16 - Professor Carolyn Abbate, Princeton University, lectured on "Die Walküre and the Dream of the Secret", reflecting her respected expertise in her critically acclaimed book *In Search of Opera.* (2002).



Tebruary 20 - Professor Jeffrey L. Buller, Mary Baldwin College and author of *Classically Romantic s*poke on "Sleep in the Ring" in a highly praised lecture illustrating his scholarly research and writing.



March 13 - Musicologist Carol Berger talk was titled "At the Heart of *Die Walküre*: Forgiveness vs. Redemption Cyclical Quests and Shadows." A 37-page assortment of reference documents was distributed as a guide for further study of the interesting topic.



April 12 -- Parsifal at the Metropolitan Opera: In an expanding Society activity, tickets were arranged for 30 Members to attend yet another out of town Wagner performance; Placido Domingo was Parsifal and Valerie Gergiev conducted.

May 9 - The Second Gala Benefit -- the first was held at Evermay in 2001 - took place in the elegant, antique-decorated salons of the Diplomatic and Counselor Officer Corps, Retired (DACOR) in Washington. The event raised important funding for general programming and the Emerging Singers Program.

 $\mathcal{M}ay$ 16 -- The Sixth Evelyn Lear and Thomas Stewart Emerging Singers Concert was presented at the German Embassy. The capacity audience acclaimed it the best concert to date in this continuing series.



May 29 -- Society Director John Pohanka, a respected Wagner expert and philanthropist, spoke on "Wagner, The Mystic." His synthesis of his half-century of study and enjoyment of Wagner's art yielded one of the season's most highly praised lectures.
