JAMES MORRIS RECEIVES WAGNER SOCIETY AWARD

Bass-baritone James Morris, the world's leading Wotan and Hans Sachs of this generation, received the Award from **Thomas Stewart**, the world leader in these roles in the previous generation. The poignant award ceremony took place at the Society's 2005 Gala Benefit at the Grand Hyatt Hotel in Washington, DC on June 8, 2005.

James Morris joins the distinguished roster of previous recipients of the Award, in addition to Thomas Stewart: Placido Domingo, Father M. Owen Lee, Evelyn Lear, Heinz Fricke, Martin Feinstein and Saul Lilienstein.

September 15 (Monroe Hall, 2115 G Street, NW – one block from Funger Hall, The George Washington University). **Iain Scott**, the noted Canadian Wagner authority will inaugurate the season with his lecture demonstration titled "Richard Wagner and the Inspiration of Italy." Mr. Scott is well know to Members and Friends from his talk on *Die Meistersinger* (October 2005) and his appearances at the seminars held jointly with the Smithsonian Institution Resident Associate Program for Die Walküre (November 2003) and Tristan und Isolde (February 2005).

October 14 (German Embassy) 11th Emerging Singers Concert of the Evelyn Lear and Thomas Stewart Program (see Emerging Singers update, pages 4 and 5, below). The concert will feature soprano Rebecca Teem, tenor Christopher Owens and mezzo Roxanne Rowedder.



October 20 (venue to be announced) Phillip W. Raines, known to Members and Friends for his original lecture demonstrations will speak on "Magical Music and Video Moments in Wagner" including the most powerful moments in the current library of Wagner productions available to the public. The presentation will focus on conductors including Herbert von Karajan, Arturo Toscanini, Georg Solti and James Levine from live video taped performances.

November 10 (Levine School) --- OR--- November 11 (Hungarian Embassy) Alan Walker, Professor of Music at McMaster University, Hamilton, Ontario, will talk about Liszt and Wagner.

December 7 (German Embassy) Jeffrey Swann, noted international pianist and lecturer returns to present another of his perceptive and informative concerts.

January 19 (venue to be announced) Irwin Shainman, Professor Emeritus, Williams College will speak on the modern orchestra in the 19th century and Wagner's important contribution.

Evelyn Lear and Thomas Stewart received German Friendship Award

On the occasion of the 10th Evelyn Lear and Thomas Stewart Emerging Singers Concert at the German Embassy on May 27, 2005, Ms. Lear and Mr. Stewart were honored with the Federal Republic of Germany Friendship Award. The awards were presented by Deputy Chief of Mission Peter Gottwald.

"We highly appreciate what you have done and are very much looking forward to continuing our cooperation," Deputy Chief of Mission Gottwald said in presenting the award. "This will drive us even more to help supporting the young singers here in Washington D.C.," Thomas Stewart said on receiving the award.

Evelyn Lear and Thomas Stewart both look back on brilliant careers. Their distinguished singing careers took them to all of the world's important opera houses and festivals. Among the prestigious awards they won, are a number of Grammy awards for their recordings.

Ms. Lear and Mr. Stewart went to Berlin in 1957 on Fulbright Fellowships, thus starting a long association with Germany and with the Deutsche Oper Berlin in particular. Versatile Ms. Lear sang and triumphed internationally in many great operas, and unforgettably, created roles in contemporary operas. However, she has always been associated with Richard Strauss, her favorite composer.

Mr. Stewart has a long association with the German operatic repertory. He sung the great Heldenbaritone roles, the leading Wagnerian parts at Bayreuth and has performed in the leading opera houses of the world. He particularly succeeded in the roles of Wotan in The Ring and Hans Sachs in Die Meistersinger von Nürnberg. (Excerpts from German Embassy Website.)

Music Critic's Review of the 10th Emerging Singers Concert

Wagnerian Voices at the German Embassy

The Emerging Singers Program has made a noticeable mark in Washington's expanding Opera scene. Led by star opera veterans **Evelyn Lear** and her husband **Thomas Stewart**, the project seeks out young American singers to mentor and promote toward careers as the next Wagnerian vanguard -- a tall order, since Wagner's operas, earth-moving forces in the cosmic reordering of the operatic world, make extraordinary and singular demands on the human voice. Seven singers proved themselves right on track at the German Embassy Friday.

In a concert sponsored by the Wagner Society of Washington, DC the performers offered excerpts from eight Wagner operas, three from his seminal *Ring* cycle. Not least, the superb pianist Betty Bullock transformed the embassy's Bluethner instrument into a virtual opera orchestra.

Soprano Diane Barton greeted the Wartburg's hall (*Dich, teure Halle from Tannhäuser*) with seemingly effortless movement between her vibrant mezzo range and her topmost notes. An ardent Senta (*Der fliegende Holländer*), she was also a sonorously

ecstatic Sieglinde (*Die Walküre*). In the title role of *Lohengrin*, tenor Joshua Saxon tended toward a sturdy if trained quality with noticeable breaks between vocal registers; as Lohengrin's father (*Parsifal*), he took on greater lyricism.

A steely baritone, Nathan Bahny made a stolidly lecherous Alberich (*Das Rheingold*) and (*Siegfried*). Daniel Brenna set his tenor on a blissful course lightly trod in Erik's dream (*Holländer*) and rapturously proclaimed by Siegmund in his duet with Sieglinde (*Walküre*).

Attired in an imposing long, dark coat, Charles Robert Austin employed his vibrant baritone to portray a Wotan of commanding presence rent with despair (Siegfried and Walküre). Bass Pawel Izdebski was a basso profundo both as a booming Fafner (Siegfried) and an anguished King Marke (Tristan und Isolde); while soprano Rebecca Teem, the newest of the group, ended the exciting evening with a rousing Hojotoho, Bruennhilde's belligerent call to arms (Walküre).

The brief updates on selected singers, below, will be expanded in the second edition of *The Wagner Singer* publication in October.

Charles Robert Austin was Wotan in *Die Walküre* with the of Opera Theater Pittsburgh's *Ring* Saga. He sang King Marke with Opera Puerto Rico and with Virginia Opera. He will appear with the Canton, Ohio Symphony Wagner concert. He covered the role of Wotan at the Metropolitan Opera. Upcoming engagements include the Madison Opera, and Opera Pacific and the Seattle Symphony. He has taken up residence in Seattle, Washington as his career advances. He sang excerpts of Wotan in the 10th Emerging Singers Concert in May 2005.


Nathan Bahny recently sang Alberich in *Das Rheingold* with the Opera Theater Pittsburgh's production of the first two *Ring* operas in the Jonathan Dove version. He will perform the same role in *Das Rheingold* with Opera Pacific in 2006. In addition to that, he sang the title role in Handel's *Saul* and the role of Orest in Richard Strauss' *Elektra*. He sang Alberich in the 10th Emerging Singers Concert in May 2005.

Jennifer Roderer was praised in the Argentine daily, *La Nacion*, (July 14, 2005) in a review of her performance in *Die Walküre* as Fricke at Teatro Colon that she "confirmed the remarkable excellence of American singers in the use of a school of singing that gives priority to idiomatic accuracy and knowledge of the repertory."

David Smith continues to grow as an emerging American Heldentenor. He recently sang at the Third Gala Benefit 2005 and is preparing to cover both Siegmund and Siegfried in Paris at the Theater du Châtalet.

Thomas Rolf Truhitte sang his first *Tristan* with Virginia Opera in February of 2005 with Jeanine Altmeyer as Sieglinde. He sang Siegmund in *Die Walküre* in Manaus at the Teatro Amazonas, for the First Ring Cycle in South America. He was engaged for the Seattle Ring 2005 to sing Froh. He will cover Siegmund for the Toronto *Ring* in 2006. Other engagements include roles at Dayton Opera and Opera Monte Carlo.

Jennifer Wilson performed her first Brünnhilde in *Götterdämmerung* with the Lyric Opera of Chicago (replacing Jane Eaglen) in one performance; she also performed Helmwige, Gutrune and the Third Norn in that *Ring*. Placido Domingo personally invited her to perform Brünnhilde in *Die Walküre* at the Savolinna Festival in Finland with the Washington National Opera. Other upcoming engagements include her first Isolde with the Opéra de Montpellier, and *Die Walküre* at the Châtelet in Paris as well as debuts with Santa Fe Opera, Teatro Colón in Buenos Aires, Thessalonica Concert Hall in Greece, and Opera Australia as *Turandot*.

A Festive Wagner Event The Nation's Capital City

The purpose of the Gala was to raise funds for future society activities. These include the Evelyn Lear and Thomas Stewart Emerging Singers Program for which important seed capital was raised to establish an endowment to support aspiring Wagner singers. The presentation of the Wagner Society Award to James Morris by Thomas Stewart was a highlight of the festive event. (see page 1)

Chairman Jim Holman and Yoko (Mrs.Thomas) Arthur led planning for the gala from the outset. Jim served as Master of Ceremonies for the evening. Yoko carried out her responsibilities with impressive precision and efficiency. Drawing on her extensive executive and leadership experience at WETA and CPB she mobilized a large cast of volunteers and contributors with the assistance of Board Member Betty Byrne.

Auctions Live and Silent

The auctions provided a principal source of funds for our programs. A live-auction bidding session was led by Bob Madigan (Washington Radio Station WTOP and Classical 103.5) for two items: tickets to James Morris performances in the 2005-2006 Metropolitan Opera season and Four Season Hotel accommodations, and (separately) dinner with Evelyn Lear and Thomas Stewart.

A treasure trove of Wagneriana and opera lovers' memorabilia was listed in the 14-page souvenir program for the event. These included antique Wagner books and scores as well as recordings, videos, and DVDs. Photograph contributions included works by Met Opera official photographer Winnie Klotz; a photo of Placido Domingo to be personally autographed to the buyer; and James Morris, Thomas Stewart and Evelyn Lear in costume for major roles in their careers. Two interesting tours were offered: the National Zoo a behind-the-scenes look at a "Fafner!", as well as the National Air and Space Museum. Parties include a private party in New York City with Met Opera artists. Heavy silent bidding ensued throughout the night for costume jewelry. A Washington National Opera costume drew eyes and a generous bid. Solo piano and flute concerts for one's private home were scooped up to cash in during the year-end holiday season.



TRISTAN UND ISOLDE Weekend (February 11-13) Wagner Society-Smithsonian Joint Seminar and Virginia Opera Performance

The two-day seminar with the Smithsonian Resident Associate Program (RAP) was staged on Friday and Saturday February 11 and 12, 2005 in the Hirschorn Museum Ring Auditorium. A Sunday matinee performance of *Tristan und Isolde* on February 13 was presented at the George Mason University Arts Center by the Virginia Opera under the baton of Maestro Peter Mark. (*Tristan und Isolde* events recalled a similar joint seminar with the Smithsonian in September 2003 and the Washington National Opera presentation of *Die Walküre* in that month.)

The *Tristan* seminar included presentations by distinguished Wagner experts Carolyn Abbate (Princeton), Iain Scott (Canadian Broadcasting Corporation), Saul Lilienstein (Washington-based musicologist), Jeffrey Swann (international concert pianist and lecturer), Peter Mark (conductor, Virginia Opera), Professor John de Gaetani, Jeffrey Buller (classicist and dean of Mary Baldwin College), and Winnie Klotz (former official photographer of the Metropolitan Opera). Chairman Jim Holman served as the moderator for the ten separate seminar presentations with active audience participation.
